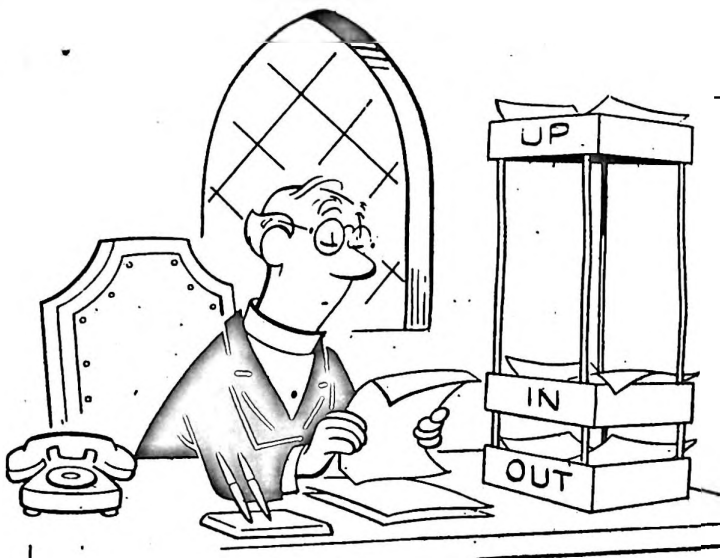

Our little flock was challenged to meet many special needs. More of our members became active in service projects than in recent years. We have been gladdened by continued growth and service in CROSSROADS, our Senior Center, and by the introduction of Pastor Fargo's new ministry for performing artists.

In this perpetually-changing community we have the daily blessing of finding new opportunities for serving our Lord and meeting them through his wonderful supply of grace and gifts. 1982 will confront us with new challenges and, of course, different crises . . . but we anticipate either with faith in our Lord's promises and joy in our Lord's calling . . . glad to be here!

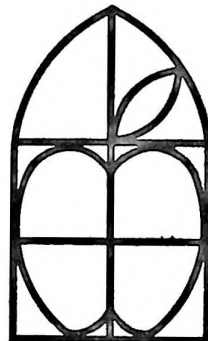

PASTORAL REPORT

The year in review . . .

1. Our major effort of last year in assuming sponsorship of our Senior Center, CROSSROADS at Saint Luke, continues to be a blessing for all involved. Daily census continues to rise. Our program provides a great deal of assistance to the elderly besides the fine nutrition services for breakfast and lunch. Pastor Splittgerber has "settled in," assisted by an assistant director, Nieves Guichardo.
2. FRIENDS of Saint Luke, our special program for receiving additional funding for the maintenance of our many ministries and presence here at Times Square, has topped \$ 60,000 in receipts (since late 1978). Our Friends have enabled us to end the year "in the black" for the second time in many years . . . assisting with necessary maintenance and repairs as well as funding special service projects of the parish. Without such good Friends we would be required to cut back on services and, ultimately, diminish our trust funds (which now provide nearly 1/3 of our financial support).
3. A number of improvements to the properties were accomplished: the renovation and ceramic tiling of the rest rooms in the Senior Center, the installation of a doorway and ramp connecting the dining area and recreation room of the Senior Center, the painting of the entire church hall/Senior Center areas, re-decoration of the church lounge and installation of chandeliers and spot lights for recitals (through the generous gift of the Ladies Aid Society), painting and caulking of exterior windows and the doors of the parish house and sanctuary, cleaning and painting of the boiler room, installation of a large, new closet to accomodate most of the used clothing for distribution.
4. The former super resigned to accept another position, beginning a process of enduring several replacements for short periods of time. Finally, the Church Council approved a recommendation to secure a half-time super, with funding provided for additional part-time help as needed. This arrangement has worked out quite satisfactorily despite some turnover in personnel.
5. We welcomed to our facilities the School for Young Artists, a fully accredited program for 3-8 year olds, serving families in the area. Its special curriculum is geared to gifted youngsters, most of whom are children of performing arts families. The program is housed in the gymnasium and meets Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4 pm.
6. Losses incurred during a burglary shortly before Christmas included our office typewriters, telephone answering machine, miscellaneous equipment and office postage stamps. Sometime during the holidays the large, carved crucifix placed near the pulpit was also taken.

7. An exciting new ministry was formally launched in October with the call and installation of Pastor Jerry Fargo as Minister for Performing Artists. At this point his service is non-stipendary and experimental, hopefully the prelude of a meaningful specialized ministry of Saint Luke's to the large number of persons in our area involved in the performing arts. Bishop Ressimyer was present for the installation, members and friends participated, and St. Luke's ladies provided a marvelous reception for him after the Service.
8. Our "annual" Benefit for Saint Luke was again held on our Anniversary Sunday, St. Luke's Day. This year Ted Hook's ON STAGE Restaurant and Cabaret provided the site for another enjoyable evening . . . and an event that added \$ 3,452 to Friends of Saint Luke and, ultimately, to our ministries.
9. On the first Sunday in Advent we dedicated to the Glory of God a beautiful set of blue paraments and vestments, a thank-offering from Mrs. Emma Hahn. The new color is a recommendation of the Lutheran Book of Worship for Advent, symbolizing hope. Family and friends of Anton Koester presented a memorial gift of floor candelabra for the free-standing altar. The bronze units are useable also as processional torches.
10. A bequest of twenty thousand dollars was made from the estate of J. Louis Schaefer, to be placed in the endowment fund of the parish. Presently over one-fourth of our income for current budget needs is provided by the trust funds of Saint Luke's, gifts made over the years by members concerned about perpetuating the ministry in changing times.

SOME GOALS FOR 1982

4. Replace rectory windows with insulated units to conserve energy and correct ill-fitting units.
5. Study the desirability of introducing every-Sunday Eucharists.
6. Explore Saint Luke's involvement in proposed Lutheran union targeted for 1986 (merger of Lutheran Church in America, American Lutheran Church and the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches).

TREASURER'S
REPORT 

Dear Fellow-Members and Friends,

As we are again at the beginning of a new year we should review the past year and look forward to our present one. The attached report shows that we not only were able to pay our way last year but had a surplus in our Friends account of \$ 5,258.80, after having provided a varied and substantial program for the year. I want to thank all our members and friends for making this possible.

Contributions toward the end of the year changed our expectation of having a deficit to that of being able to more than meet our needs.

Our current budget is some \$ 16,000.00 greater than our expenses last year. In regard to our envelope collections, we expect to be able to show an increase of some \$ 6,000.00. We were able to raise \$ 3,000.00 last year from a small group of our members. Our plan for this year is to make a much greater effort. We expect to meet with our people and explain our needs to them so that they can better determine what they wish to contribute for our ministry. Some increases in our other accounts should provide the necessary funds to again balance our budget.

We contemplate having the stone facades of our church and parish house cleaned and tuck-pointed. This may entail an expenditure that we may have to pay over a three year period. Our present balance in our Friends account plus an additional amount in our present budget would enable us to get the project started.

Again, thanks to all our members and friends for making 1981 a good year. Thanks also to Miss Christine Gausman, our assistant treasurer and to Mrs. Virginia Callahan for their assistance during the year.

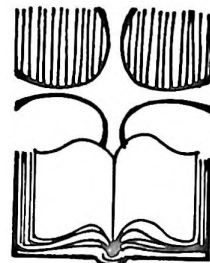

An interesting project early in 1981 was the putting together of 6 layettes for LWR to be presented at the international convention of LWML. Together with the Ladies' Aid we made this gift, and through the efforts of women across the US and Canada, about 22,000 layettes were contributed for babies around the world.

We continue to host the coffee hour once a month, provide escorts for patients at Roosevelt Hospital, assist at the Coffee House, and provide help with the distribution of clothing from the BIG CLOSET to participants at CROSSROADS at Saint Luke.

Our meetings are held once a month after the Sunday service during the winter months, with evening meetings when the daylight hours are stretched by daylight saving time. We usually have one meeting to which the congregation is invited and we serve sandwiches along with cake and coffee.

Last October we hosted the fall rally of the Manhattan Zone of LWML. About 35 women attended and enjoyed the interesting illustrated talk on Russia by Pastor Thomas Sluberski of Hastings-on-Hudson.
