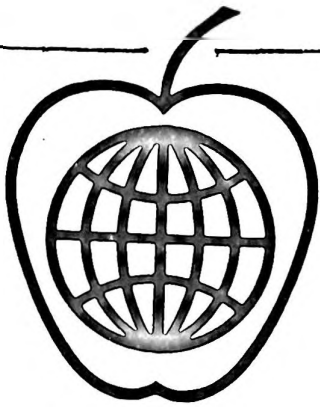

My dear Members & Friends of Saint Luke . . .

Occasionally, people question the efforts and resources poured into human services by the church. Money and energy ought best be spent on "spiritual" ministry, i.e. preaching and teaching, celebrating the Sacraments, pastoral counseling, etc.

Vital as all of that is, I find myself in agreement with the sentiment expressed by some anonymous person: "It is as important to get people on their feet as it is to get people on their knees."

1984 was what we might modestly label "a good year." It was not vintage, but it was good! Our new friends serving through Sanctuary for Families have settled in and are a blessing to many abused women and children desperately needing help. The overwhelming response of members and friends to our FIX-UP CAMPAIGN, raising funds to underwrite costs of the new heating system, parish house roof, and organ repairs demonstrates a loving parish vitality. And more new faces and new members keeps us encouraged in our outreach, our attempts to be faithful witnesses and to strengthen our parish family in its commitment to serve the Lord.

For all of this, I thank you for your share in this Gospel Ministry . . . for your love and your encouragement, your patience and your forgiveness . . . God bless you!

TREASURER'S REPORT



Dear Fellow-Members and Friends:

This past year was a little different from some of our other years. We had a considerable number of large equipment and repair expenditures. A new water heater and a new boiler were installed, the organ was repaired, the roof had to be repaired, the old boiler kept needing repairs. Expenditures for these items were in addition to our other normal items. After only five months of the year we had spent almost our entire budget allowance for heating on heating oil. Things did not look too good but, believe it or not, we ended the year with a balanced amount of receipts and expenditures.


After extending our thanks to you and to our Friends who generously supported our program, I shall have something to say on how we were able to complete this year in this fashion. I also want to thank our pastor at this time. It was through his concern and help that we were able to accomplish this.

We had to use \$ 14,285.63 from our Friends account in order to have our receipts and expenditures balance out. We made the Fix Up Campaign account a separate individual fund. We paid out of this account \$ 22,981.95 and received \$ 14,340.20 in 1984, leaving a balance owing of \$ 8,641.75 for 1985. Our pledges and payments for 1985 are greater than this figure. Any amounts received above our present needs will be used to reduce our borrowing for the Cleaning and Repairing of our church facade. The City of New York/Dept. for the Aging agreed to repay us \$ 6,459.00 for repairs and equipment already completed. Our insurance company is to pay us the sum of \$ 1,750.00 on outstanding claims. We were also able to reduce the balance owing on our Cleaning and Repairing of the church facade by \$ 5,000.00

With these adjustments, we were able to present a balanced account for the year.

We thank all of you once more.

Dear Family in Christ,

1984 marked a year of turning for our Crossroads program. Extensive repairs, refurbishings, and reconstruction have provided us with a better functioning and more "homey" center for our neighborhood seniors. And all our work was paid for by generous donations from our participants, fund-raising efforts, and by the New York City Department for the Aging. With help from a few faithful volunteers, we were able to completely strip and resurface the natural wood floor as well as repair the entrance way and cover it with a lovely grey carpeting. We also installed carpeting in our treasurer's office and painted the restrooms and foyers. New equipment includes a urinal for the men's rest room, a new convection oven with grill and broiler, a new hot water heater, and new office equipment provided by a grant from the Exxon Corporation. We also received two used (but functioning) barber chairs for use in our "Haircuts and Manicures" program on Thursdays.

The dining room was "re-orchestrated" to give our clientele more room to eat and move around, and includes also a new service area, enabling us to serve meals without blocking crucial exit ways. To accommodate the 160 people who eat here on site every day, we have initiated an 11:30 meal service in addition to our regular 12:30 service. We feed about 50 people early, which means that our dining room is "packed" with no more than 120 people at one time -- far below our actual 185 seating capacity.


Crossroads is a service-oriented center but, most of all, it is a home-away-from-home for the many people who live in SROs and other small, cramped quarters. We try our hardest to assure all of our seniors that they will be able to come to an active but peaceful environment to eat and socialize and play. This is our most happy gain this year -- the lack of anxiety-producing incidents. We still have a few, and that can't be avoided. But the incidents have decreased about 90%. Perhaps placing our office in eye-view of the entire center has made a difference. In any circumstance, we are grateful for the change, and thank God for bestowing so many good blessings upon our work. We have more work to do, however, and we will continue to do all in our power to make this ministry of St. Luke's one that this church can be happy it supports.

THE MINISTRY OF MUSIC AT SAINT LUKE'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

We are blessed by the talents and dedication of our Church Choir. Presently numbering almost 20 members, these singers offer their talents, time, and loyalty each week as they prepare musical offerings to the Glory of God. The Choir's goal is threefold: to inspire participation in the Sunday Liturgy through the singing of hymns, psalms, and liturgical settings; to present anthems of praise and thanksgiving as an appropriate reflection of the Sunday lessons; and to provide fellowship for those with the gift of singing. Our choral repertoire encompasses a varied menu of styles, from pre-Baroque to the Romantic oratorio choruses to spiritual arrangements to contemporary settings of the Holy Gospel. We welcome new members who are willing to serve God through music.

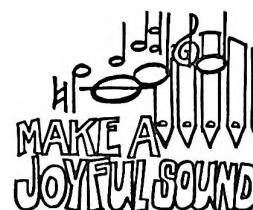
A special word of thanks to John Danielson, who is responsible for the repairs and improvements to the grand piano in the church parlor. We now enjoy -- and appreciate greatly -- new ivories and an improved action, and will be purchasing a piano dolly so that the instrument may be easily moved without damaging the legs.

The music committee will be meeting soon to assess the state of the church's pipe organ. The organ, built by M. P. Moller in 1923, hails from the era of organ building when electrification was in its beginning stages of development. Consequently, the electrical system, similar to the telephone switching system of the same era, is now obsolete and in great need of repair. Over the past 52 years, minimal maintenance (usually on an emergency basis!) has been performed in addition to necessary tunings. However, it is no longer prudent to continue such emergency repairs without a study of long-range plans for the instrument. Like the boiler, the time has already arrived whereby the music committee must seriously propose solutions to an inevitable and final breakdown of service. The organ at Saint Luke's is the backbone of the church's music and worship ministry on Sunday mornings and, by the Grace of God, it continues to function at all. Several proposals are being considered for a possible benefit concert by the church soloists and choir. The music committee welcomes any suggestions and encourages contributions and support as we investigate the future of the church's musical instrument.

Finally, I offer my thanks to the pastor, music committee, choir, and congregation for their continued support during my first several months as Director of Music. I look forward to a continued partnership in the months and years to come.

FINAL REPORT OF DORCAS SOCIETY/COMBINED REPORT WITH
THE LADIES AID SOCIETY



This is the last report to be rendered by me as President of the Ladies Aid Society of Saint Luke's Church. And I won't even be here to read it as Edward and I will be in Lexington, KY, visiting our daughter and her family.

We had two major projects which involved both ladies' societies. We were hostesses for the spring rally of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League/Manhattan Zone for which the program featured three of our own younger members who shared with the audience how they found this church and decided to become affiliated with the ministry at this place. Each person had a most interesting story to tell, and all in attendance appreciated their willingness to testify to their faith and how much it had meant to them.

The Manhattan Lutheran Women's Missionary League and Brooklyn Zones were responsible for planning the Atlantic District Lutheran Women's Missionary League Biennial Convention, which was held in May at Fallsview Hotel in Ellenville, NY. Each society in the two zones was to be in charge of all duties of one of the many committees. Ladies Aid and Dorcas chose to be responsible for the altar and flowers. I attended many of the meetings of the two zones as presidents were automatically on the convention committee, and I attended the convention as the official delegate from the two societies. I ordered the flowers, made arrangements with the hotel for a table to serve as an altar, had my husband construct a cross for it, made arrangements for wine and wafers for the communion service and also proper vessels for distribution. I carried the cross for the opening communion service and worried that the supply of wine wouldn't be sufficient as the women continued to stream across the platform. But there was enough -- just barely! After the service, I could relax and enjoy the rest of the convention, especially the bountiful meals and the congenial company of the ladies from True Light Church in Chinatown.

In Fall 1984, the Dorcas Guild was dissolved and became part of the Ladies Aid so, instead of two, we are now one! This was done for practical reasons as several women were members of both groups and the Ladies Aid President, Elsie Koester, was anxious to be relieved of her responsibilities of office. Since the Ladies Aid is incorporated, it was the decision to dissolve Dorcas. Meetings continue to be held on the Second Sunday, and members are responsible for Coffee Hour on the First and Second Sundays of each month. We will continue to serve Saint Luke's whenever possible.

One of the on-going and long-term projects of Ladies Aid/Dorcas was the Hospital Chaplaincy Program at Roosevelt Hospital. Christine Gausman, Virginia Callahan, and Martha Malina each served for more than 20 years, going on the Third Sunday of each month to escort Protestant patients to the service arranged by a chaplain. I joined the group a number of years ago. A couple of years back, we asked

for help and members from Holy Trinity have taken over from us in the even-numbered months. In January 1985, Chaplain Dewey told us he has people from an Episcopal church who could take the months when we have served and thus "retire" the faithful few from Saint Luke.

Year-end financial reports are available for those interested in knowing how our money is raised and disbursed. Considerable support is given to physical needs around the church building, providing funds for the cabinets in the first floor office, refinishing and repairing chairs and tables in the lounge, cleaning of choir robes, and donating the proceeds of the rummage sale to the Fix-Up Fund. We have also made financial contributions to help both Saint Luke's door ministry and the outstanding debt on repairing the church facade. Funds were also provided for Project FIND's senior citizen Thanksgiving Dinner, Lutheran World Relief, Lutheran Community Services, and Concordia College, Bronxville.

I have enjoyed the opportunity of serving as President of the Dorcas Society for several years and as President of the combined group until a successor is elected in a couple of months. We would be so happy to welcome new women into the organization because many of us members are advancing in years and are unable to do as much physically as we have in the past.
