

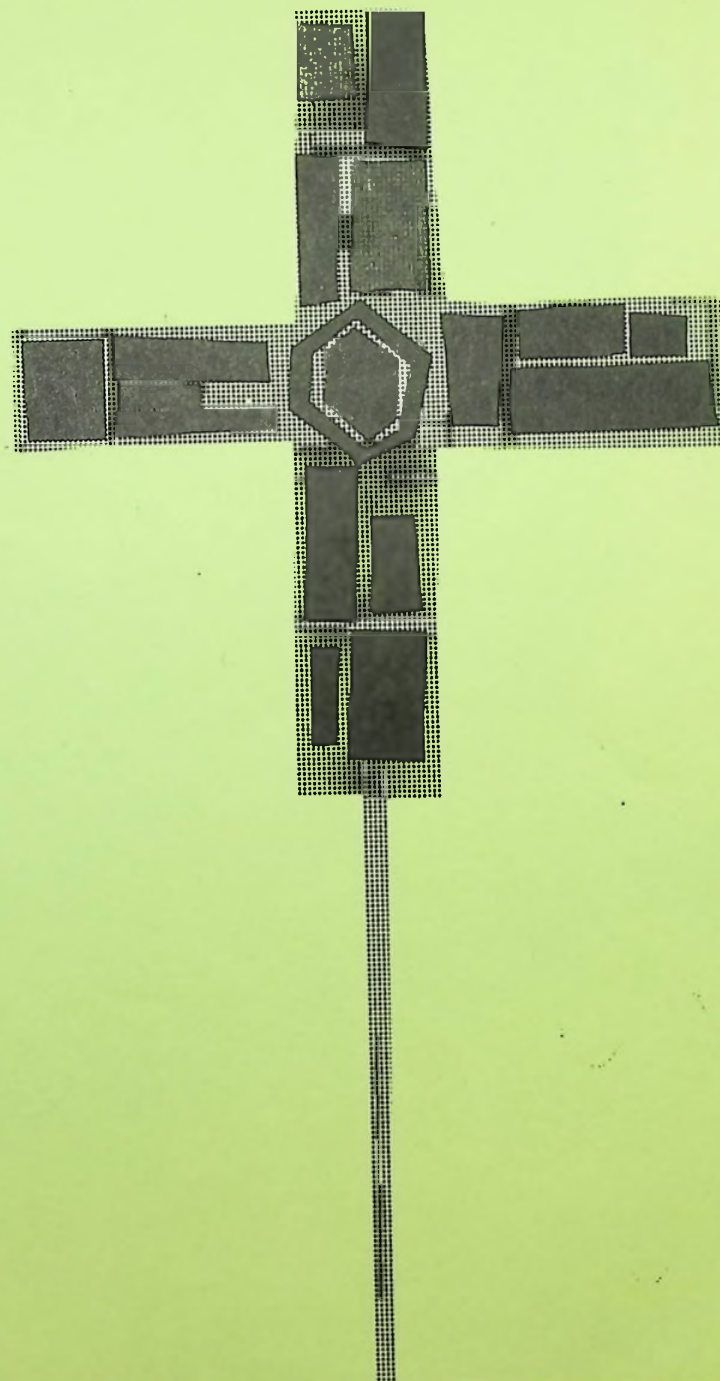

Dear Fellow-Members and Friends:

You have again made it possible for me to present a good report for the past year. I want to thank you for your contributions and also for fulfilling your pledges for the Fix-Up Campaign. I thank our many friends for their generous support. Mention should also be made that our pastor made this report possible by bringing in additional funds for our program.

In regard to our "Friends Fund," we received \$22,588.67. We had to use \$20,811.34 of these receipts to pay our expenses. Although these expenses were \$12,665.10 above 1984, we were able to meet them all.

In our budget for 1986, we are increasing the amount for envelope contributions to \$34,000.00. Last year, we received \$30,329.00. We believe the higher amount can be obtained.

The attached report will explain more fully our income and expenses. You will also find an accounting of our additional accounts and funds.

We thank our Heavenly Father for His Blessings during this year. I want to thank Mrs. Virginia Callahan and Miss Christine Gausman for their assistance to me as Treasurer.

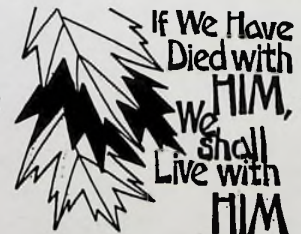

Dear Fellow Members:

I am pleased to report that 1985 was one of the best at CROSSROADS at Saint Luke.

During this year, our Social Worker, Hilary Davidson, was permanently located at St. Malachy's Church, servicing our home-bound and case-assistance clients in coordination with CROSSROADS' assistant director, Nieves Taveras. Nieves has continued to grow in her job, handling most of CROSSROADS' 30 hour/month case management load in addition to the entire Homebound Meals contingent. In February 1985, Nieves gave birth to her first child, a girl, Julissa.

Lora Johnson, our dishwasher, who came to us from Job Path Job Training Services, also gave birth to a little girl in December, Christina. Lora is back at work now and doing a fine job. Our cook, Mel Marrant, continues to provide our clients with fine, nutritionally balanced meals (200 a day). Our Senior Staff Member, Lydia Adams, is always giving more than her worth in kitchen aide services.

A wonderful joint-contribution of \$4,800.00 from St. Peter's Lutheran Church's Youth Group (Huntington Station, Long Island) and the Aid Association for Lutherans has made a number of special additions possible: new stainless steel service tables; a new glass-front refrigerator; a new washer and dryer; a water cooler; a new stereo system for music and dancing; and, finally, a new IBM XT computer and printer. The latter was made possible by contributions from the Theatre Desk, the 9th Avenue Food Festival, and other various private contributions.

The new IBM XT will greatly facilitate our program at CROSSROADS, as well as serve the Church in record-keeping, fiscal, etc. 1986 will find us transferring all our records and record-keeping activities to the computer. Wish us good luck!

An Advisory Council for CROSSROADS was set up this year to advise the staff and Church re: the desires and needs of the Seniors at CROSSROADS. Sophie Keane is the Chairperson; Gen Savio is Recording Secretary. Other members include



John Keane, Mary Parachini, Julian Harris, Pedro Hermoso, Manuel Navas, and ex-officio members Chris Greene and Pastor Hansen.

Through a generous contribution from the Bowery Savings Bank, we were able to offer a Thanksgiving Day meal -- turkey and all the trimmings...AND plenty to take home for 225 CROSSROADS members. The Bowery also supplied half-bushel fruit baskets for the homebound clients. Let's hear it for the Bowery!

Goals for the coming year at CROSSROADS include resurfacing the floor and painting the walls, installation of a new TV and movie system, improvement and increase in recreational activities, up-date and issuance of CROSSROADS I.D. cards, refurbishing of the bathrooms, continued re-evaluation of space usage, and the initiation of a vigorous Senior Exercise Program.

I hope all of these additions and changes continue to reflect the care and love that Saint Luke's has for its Senior Program and participants. To serve the Seniors of this area is a great privilege and responsibility. Let us all go forward to serve them in the love of Christ.

THE MINISTRY OF MUSIC  
AT SAINT LUKE'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

The year 1985 marked several beginnings for the music at Saint Luke's Church. First, the organ committee was appointed to study various proposals for replacing or repairing the 1923 Moller pipe organ. Second, the Allen electronic instrument was moved from the Senior Center to the balcony as a backup to the pipe organ as well as to experiment in the choir/organ placement.

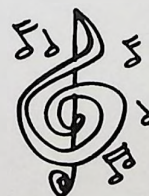
The organ committee has been co-chaired by John Danielson and Kathleen Weber. To assist in the committee's decision, they hired Barbara Owen, a nationally-known organ consultant, to survey the pipe organ's mechanical condition and tonal qualities. An evaluation and recommendation was then compiled by Ms. Owen and presented to the committee for study. After reading several articles and books on church organ design, the committee visited a number of Manhattan churches to compare the craftsmanship, installation techniques, and tonal qualities of various builders. The committee is now studying several long-term solutions available and practical to the membership of Saint Luke's.

The Allen electronic instrument has been used primarily for backup worship on those occasions when the pipe organ has not been functioning. We thank Don Fuelling for contributing the necessary materials for constructing a level platform in the balcony, and Mark Buchan and Carlos Isaac for their assistance in the construction.

We are blessed to have continued worship leadership from the Church Choir. These gifted people offer their talents each week as the church meets for the Celebration of the Eucharist. In addition to regular rehearsals, the choir members participate in many areas of the church life, including the annual benefit, ushering, the Church Council, and rummage sales. We enjoyed singing with other Lutheran choirs as Dr. Paul Manz led a hymn festival at Saint Peter's Lutheran Church. Thank you, church choir, for being such an important part of our worship and church life!

We had a good year, a fun year, including a membership drive and, indeed, five ladies expressed intentions to join.

Our monthly programs (October - June) were a mixture of current event topics presented by a speaker, a filmstrip, or a musical program by one of our Lukans. (The Congregation and visitors are always invited to attend after the Coffee Hour.) A sampling of our recent programs included:

A box was made, and the Congregation was invited to join in collecting items. A suggested list was provided, and the gifts were then delivered to Brooklyn in time for the gift wrapping.

The Ladies Aid income was, as always, derived from membership dues, rummage sales, etc. In 1985, we contributed to the Friends of Saint Luke, Saint Luke's Door Ministry, Concordia College in Bronxville, Lutheran Community Services, Lutheran World Relief, and Lutheran World Relief for World Hunger.
