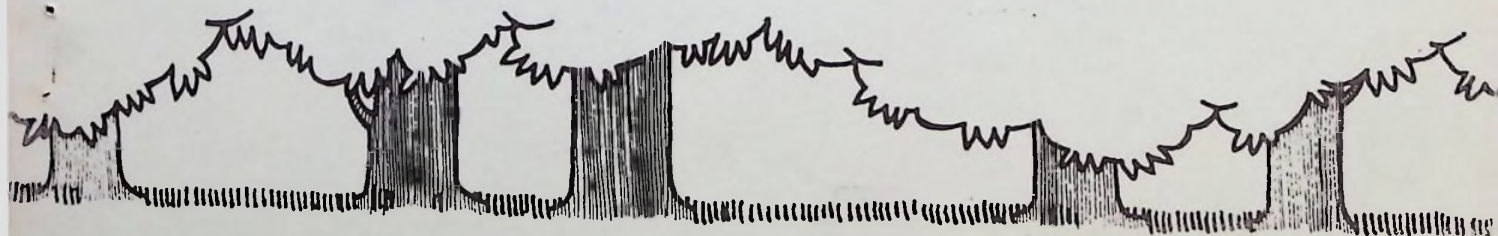

PASTOR'S REPORT

25 February 1991

Dear Sisters and Brothers . . .

The teasing temperatures and balmy breezes of Spring are raising my hopes for its early advent. While Winter 1990-91 has not been very cold, the darkness and dampness of the season weighs extra-heavily on the long Soup Kitchen line that wends its weary way down Restaurant Row. Winter's weight tends also to take its toll of many on Sunday mornings who snuggle back under their blankets and comforters rather than head off to "the little church off Times Square"!

I'm ripe for Spring and for the hope and joy that always comes our way as LENT gradually wanes and the Resurrection of our Lord brings exhilarating optimism and confidence and renewed faith. On ASH WEDNESDAY we gathered in "dust and ashes" (spiritually, of course -- at least for the dust) . . . to begin our pilgrimage toward Calvary and Jesus' atoning death for us all. Our parish family and friends can be duly proud, even as we are humbly grateful, for the evidence of God's blessings on these monumental projects . . .

1990 also gave us opportunity to celebrate 140 years of ministry to this community . . . always growing in ministry to this community as well. The wonderful celebration on St. Luke's Day pumped renewed confidence and commitment into our sense of mission and ministry.

Now rounding out sixteen years of my pastorate among you, I give thanks for our fellowship all these years. You have been a blessing in my life and I pray that we may continue to be blessings to one another and others as we boldly yet gently share the Gospel in Word and deed.

Well, we had another good year! Although our expenditures are some \$ 10,000 greater than those in 1989, with the end of the year contributions and gifts from our Friends, we were able to balance our budget for the year 1990!

We were able to transfer \$ 25,353.53 from our budget income to our Renovation Fund. That whittles down our debt on that huge project to approximately \$ 55,000.

You will find herewith an accounting of our income and expenditures for 1990, as well as a report on the Special Funds we have for designated purposes.

I thank all of you and our many Friends of St. Luke for making 1990 a year in which we were able again to carry on our many ministries with a balanced budget.

Dear Members and Friends,

Our Ladies Aid Society is a rather small group of ladies and we are always happy to welcome more members into our group. Regardless of our small group, we enjoy each other's company and continue to work on projects for St. Luke's and outside charities.

Some of our members have been helping out with the Soup Kitchen, and others have helped sort clothing to be given out at the Wednesday clothing distribution.

We have paid our pledge for the new Organ and also given a matching gift for the Elsie Koester Memorial Fund, which was designated toward the restoration of the communion rail. A bequest received from the Estate of Elsie Koester was added to the renovation fund.

We continue to collect special items for charities and worthy causes. A box in the narthex is available for you to help along with these projects:

Campbell Soup labels. We have sent 1,434 labels to Bethesda Lutheran Home in Watertown, Wisconsin. They in turn redeem them for audio visual equipment, educational aids, library items, computers and recreation equipment.

Stamps for Missions. Both foreign and U.S. cancelled stamps help to support mission causes around the world.

Eyeglasses for the Needy. In 1990 we sent 16 pair.

Tea Tags. For an elementary school class in Teaneck, NJ. They classify, count and segregate them geographically as a class project.

We extend a sincere welcome to any ladies of the congregation to join us and help us grow in numbers so that we might spread our fellowship further and hopefully increase our projects for Saint Luke's and others.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow officers for their loyal support during the year: Elsie Reichert, Vice President; Virginia Callahan, Treasurer; and Gen Savior, Secretary.

St. Luke's **Crossroads** 1990 experienced another year of expansion as we endeavor to respond to the growing needs of the elderly. The **Crossroads** program prepared and served 52,836 congregate and homebound meals with an outstanding staff consisting of seven full-time and four part-time, and a budget of \$309,692.00. The Chelsea/Clinton program (Lower West Side Meals on Wheels) prepared and served 37,928 homebound meals with a dedicated part-time staff of twenty-four and a budget of \$205,968.00.

The Center also participates in an Intergenerational Work/Study Program for Youth at Risk Interfacing with Older Adults. Although only two students are assigned to us, **Crossroads** is designated as a care site for eighteen students with a budget of \$37,881.00.

Crossroads, too, is a training site for Job Path, a program designed to train and assess developmentally disabled young people.

These programs comprise a major effort of community outreach at St. Luke's successfully carried out with the cooperation and commitment of a talented and unique staff. This year it is appropriate to give special recognition to our "chef," Melvin Marrant, who has recently been honored by New York City's Department for the Aging for twenty years of service, seventeen of which have been spent at St. Luke's!

Nieves Taveras, Assistant Director of **Crossroads** and coordinator of the Chelsea program is an invaluable source of information and is generous in her dedication to the success of our mission.

Our staff misses Elizabeth Patches who, in her brief tenure with us, made significant contributions in our bookkeeping department, her leadership in the Intergenerational Program and her overall commitment to our mission. She was replaced in October by Fred John Klopfer, who is keeping our books with diligence and integrity.

Recently we replaced a refrigerator and D.F.T.A. and New York State have approved new cooking units with fourteen burners and three convention ovens, which will be installed soon.

As we look ahead to another year, we anticipate an increase in the number of clients we serve, and a decrease in our funding from D.F.T.A. (Department for the Aging) which mirrors New York City's financial crises. We've been informed of a 1.5% reduction in our support. We will, however, be able to offset this as we



increase the suggested meal contribution of 50¢ to 75¢, effective Monday, March 4, 1991. This is the first raise to our constituents in more than ten years.

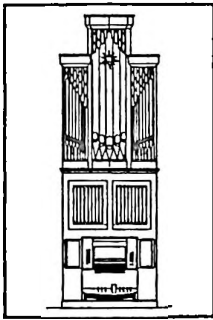

The Ministry of Music at Saint Luke's Church has been challenged with a year of celebration, opportunities for worship leadership, and contemplation. It is often through music that the Word can be expressed in times of festivity, celebration of the sacraments, and in times of sorrow. To all involved in the musical offerings at Saint Luke's, we offer our heartfelt thanks and appreciation.

The year began with the arrival in January of our new pipe organ, Opus 5895, which was built by E.F. Walcker Orgelbau of Kleinblittersdorf, (West) Germany. For several weeks, the nave of the church was filled with crates of pipes, huge and heavy windchests, the console and structural components of our custom-designed instrument. As worked progress with the installation, the congregation saw first-hand what had been long anticipated since the Organ Committee first met several years earlier. Finally, the organ was ready in late March, and was used for worship in the redecorated church for the first time on Sunday, March 4.

The celebrations of the new organ, redecorated church and the church's 140th anniversary continued throughout the year. The organ and church were dedicated on Sunday, April 22, with a Festival Eucharist in the morning, a church-wide luncheon and community open house in the afternoon, and ending with a service of Vespers. Wilma Jensen officially inaugurated the new organ on Sunday, May 20, on a day which, unfortunately, coincided with the Ninth Avenue Street Festival, but which drew a good group of interested members and local organ enthusiasts. Paul Manz led the church in a hymn festival on Wednesday evening, October 24. Who could soon forget the masterful accompaniment of hymns — old and new — by Dr. Manz as several hundred people sang with traditional Lutheran enthusiasm?

Saint Luke's ministries again received national recognition when the new organ was the featured, cover article in the July, 1990 edition of *The American Organist*, which is the official journal of the American Guild of Organists. Due to the fact that this issue "hit the streets" during the AGO convention in Boston, many organists detoured through New York City to see and play our new instrument.

The Ministry of Music also participated in the joyous occasion of the church's 140th anniversary on Sunday, October 21, with a great service of worship. With Bishop William Lazareth officiating, the choir led the worship through great choral and hymn singing, with the accompaniment of organ, a brass ensemble and handbells. That evening, the choir members once again showcased their diverse talents at the church's Annual Benefit, held this year at Barbetta Restaurant.

It is with great sadness that a talented former choir member, Christopher O'Brien, passed away early this year. The choir will participate in Christopher's memorial service in a few weeks.

Last, but not least, the Ministry of Music offers a wonderful opportunity for fellowship in the parish. The choir presented an informal baby shower for **Jioh**, son of soprano **Linde Stauber** and husband, **Andreas**. And *two* marriages are forthcoming among choir members: **Nancy Rocke** (alto) and **Mark Buchan** (tenor) will be married this Spring (with the choir singing at the service); **Caroline Popp** (switch-hitter alto & soprano) and **David Sitler** (bass) will also be married this Spring. Our warmest congratulations to them all!
